

# Summer school Doing, Writing, Thinking Sport History 8<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> September 2019

# **Final Report**

**Direction** Grégory Quin Institut des Sciences du Sport Université de Lausanne

#### Organisation

Hosted by the *Institut des Sciences du Sport de l'Université de Lausanne* (ISSUL) and the *Department of the International Relations* of the Université de Lausanne (RI), and organized in collaboration with the *International Center for Sport History and Culture* (ICSHC) from the *De Montfort University*, the *Université Libre de Bruxelles*, the *Ecole Doctorale de l'Institut des Sciences du Sport de l'Université de Lausanne* (EDISSUL) and also the special support of the *Sportwissenschaftliche Gesellschaft der Schweiz* (SGS)<sup>1</sup>, the "**Doing, Writing, Thinking Sport History**" summer school aimed to provide a unique environment for PhD students who wanted to develop skills around sport history, and to improve their network in the field. On site, beyond the commitment of Grégory Quin, the organization team was composed by Philippe Vonnard, Gil Mayencourt and Sébastien Cala.

#### Framework and ambitions

Four lectures given by leading experts and well-known Professors (Jean-Michel De Waele, Jurgen Mittag, Matthew Taylor, Dino Numerato) have covered specific methodological aspects and new issues in the field of sport history. A specific round-table was also organized about careers perspectives and difficulties for early-career researchers to deal with the first steps of their lives in and around academia, gathering Lucie Schoch, Amanda Shuman, Dino Numerato and Sylvain Dufraisse, also having Marie Sautier as expert to lead the debates. In addition, a round-table was dedicated to contemporary issues and future topics in sport history, where Jurgen Mittag, Matthew Taylor and Patrick Clastres could share and confront their views. More centraly, the participants had the opportunity to present and discuss their own research in specific sessions, in small groups, directed by early career researchers (Amanda Shuman & Grégory Quin, Sylvain Dufraisse & Nicola Sbetti, Philippe Vonnard & Sébastien Moreau). At the end of the summer school, the participants have discovered new epistemological approaches and new methodologies in sport sciences; benefited from exchanges with other young scholars; exchanged with influential and recognized professors of the field; strengthened their writing skills; improved their soft skills.

The summer school was also an opportunity for several networks to meet and present their activities to the participants. It was especially important for the Réseau d'Etude des Relations Internationales Sportives (RERIS) to present future conferences, publications opportunities and its previous achievements. The evening of September 9<sup>th</sup> was especially dedicated to the vernissage of a book based on work from several participants<sup>2</sup>, which gave a unique plateform to promote exchange between young and more experimented researchers, but which also gave an opportunity to open the summer school to the civil society.

The opportunity for the participants to present their research during the CESH conference<sup>3</sup> just at the end of the summer school – for those who wanted to do so – was also a key point of our organization, and several participants did so, mentioning how convenient it was for them.

Both those events, the CESH conference, but mostly the "Doing, Writing, Thinking Sport History" summer school, positioned the Université de Lausanne and also Switzerland as a key actor within the field of sport science in Europe and in the western world, especially for sport history. Actually, this discipline has in Lausanne one of its bigger research center worldwide with three professors, three post-docs and more than twelve PhD students, working on several national and international projects<sup>4</sup>.
